### Week 5:

- Our Martin County Emergency Management Director, Sally Waite, visited Tallahassee for Emergency Management Days. #### Halfway through Session

- Lawmakers are heading into the second half of the 2024 session on a little bit lighter pace than in some recent years, with both chambers having passed just 12 bills. About half of those are the technical statutory revision bills required each year to make updates and delete provisions superseded by new law and the bill allowing a Joint Session for the governor's annual State of the State address. By comparison, lawmakers had passed 19 bills through the first half of last year's session.
- While major priority bills are yet to pass both chambers, several top priority pieces of legislation and some other high profile measures have passed in one chamber or the other. House Speaker Paul Renner's top priority, a measure (HB 1) that seeks to force social media companies to ban kids under 16 from having accounts, passed in the House in late January, but the proposal is yet to get to the Senate floor. And the full Senate has passed President Kathleen Passidomo's top priority, a pair of health care bills (SB 7016, SB 7018) known as the "Live Healthy" initiative, which is intended to bolster the health care workforce and support technological innovation in care. Another priority in the Senate (SB 7000), a bill that seeks to give public school systems some more flexibility something promised to them last year when lawmakers expanded the state's voucher system was one of the first bills passed in the Senate this year, gaining unanimous approval on the second day of the session. It is still waiting for consideration by the full House.
- A few other high profile bills have passed one chamber or the other. Among those is a bill (HB 3) to require better enforcement of age restrictions on pornography websites, and a measure (HB 49) that would ease restrictions on when 16 and 17-year-old kids can work, that has drawn considerable attention. Both HB 3 and HB 49 have both passed the House. Another bill (HB 187) that has passed the House and has been sent to the Senate would put a definition of "antisemitism" into statute, with examples of acts that would be considered antisemitic. It has drawn attention because of increased tension amid the Israel-Hamas war. Among other bills that have moved in the other direction, having passed the Senate, is a measure (SB 280) that makes changes in how much vacation rentals, like those rented through Airbnb, can be regulated.



### Looking Ahead

- In addition to negotiations on differences in those priority measures, lawmakers still have to work out a budget. Floor consideration is expected to start Wednesday in both chambers, with the proposed spending bills (SB 2500, HB 5001) having gone through the budget committees on each side of the Capitol. Votes on each spending bill in its respective chamber could come as early as this week. Once budget bills are approved in each chamber and leaders work out allocated amounts for each section of the final spending plan, conference committees will work out a final budget agreement.
- The chambers are already fairly close together in terms of the size of the budget, with the Senate taking up a \$115.9 billion bill and the House expected to pass a \$115.5 billion budget. Issues that aren't agreed to by the Joint Budget Conference Committees are "bumped" to each chamber's Appropriations chairs who try to work out the sticking points. In some cases, differences may be decided by the House Speaker and the Senate President. The resulting Conference Committee Report has to be published 72 hours before each chamber adopts and votes on the final version of the budget.
- In terms of other legislation, the focus now shifts more toward floor sessions as House and Senate committees wind down their work. After the 50th Day, which is Feb. 22, a Senate rule prevents any additional regularly-scheduled committee meetings. At the halfway point, there remain more than 700 bills that have not been heard in any of their committees of reference as of the 30th-day of the session. With the number of remaining committee meetings dwindling, those bills will have a difficult time reaching final passage though none can be really considered dead until the session actually ends.
