BUSINESS IMPACT ESTIMATE IN ACCORDANCE WITH § 125.66(3), FLA. STAT.

The ordinance would require sexual offenders, sexual predators, convicted felons. and career offenders, who are required by law to register with the Martin County Sheriff's Office, to pay a registration fee.
