

Martin County: COVID-19 | Update: 04/07/2020

Local Actions

- No open burning is permitted due to the dry conditions.
- Martin County playgrounds, tennis, pickleball and basketball courts, park restroom facilities and athletic fields for organized and pickup are closed.
- Martin County-owned boat ramps will be open for recreational boating activities on weekdays and be closed on weekends only; Sandspirt Park and the Jensen Beach Boat Ramp north of Indian RiverSide Park will be open to commercial marine activity.

State Actions

- FDEP has closed all state-owned uplands, including beaches, islands, sandbars and emergent shoals.
- FWC has directed recreational vessels shall have no more than 10 people on-board and maintain a 50-foot distance between vessels.

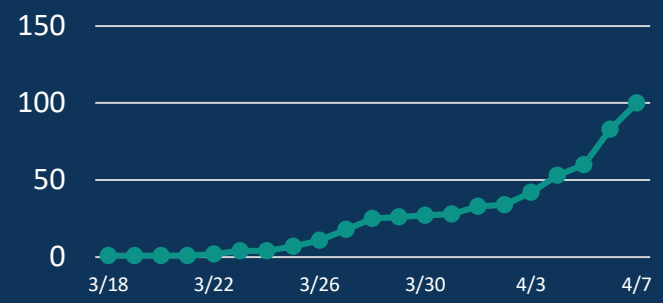

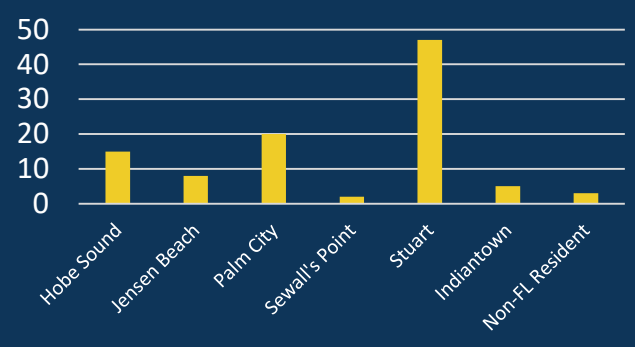
Cumulative Cases in Martin
